Dorothy L. Sayers's Writings about Work, the Economy and Social Conditions

An Annotated Bibliography

This bibliography is an appendix to Christine Fletcher's article "Vocation in Work: Dorothy L. Sayers and Economic Issues" which appears in Volume 26 of *VII: An Anglo-American Literary Review*.

Dorothy L. Sayers's writing and life show a unity in her interest in good work. The idea of what constitutes good and bad work, especially for women, is an underlying theme in many of the detective novels and becomes the central theme in *Gaudy Night*. The works in this appendix contain significant content related to the theme of work, the economy and social conditions.
